Warroad is only 5 miles south of the border and located right on the big lake.



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

Henry Boucha, Warroad Warrior

(Kah-Bay-Kah-Nong-O' Git Chi Dah)

respective books - his, an autobiography, Henry Boucha: Ojibwa, Native American Olympian, and mine a romantic comedy. An odd pairing, no doubt, that created a bond of friendship between us anyway.

Boucha is a member of the Northwest Angle Band #37 of Windigo Island and a full-blooded Ojibwa. Born in Warroad, he grew up crossing the U.S./Canada border as the seasons and purpose dictated. His father, George Boucha, was a commercial fisherman, trapper and logger. When he pulled his boat out on the Warroad Beach in the fall, George moved to either Warroad or Middlebro, Manitoba. He trapped until Christmas and cut and loaded pulp for various loggers including the CN (Canadian National Railway). He married Alice Powassin-Caron of Warroad. Alice was the granddaughter of Laughing Mary Thunder, Buffalo Point, who married Ok-zee-mi-bee-tung-Powassin, NWA # 37. Laughing Mary raised Alice in Waroad and Buffalo Point, after Alice's mother, Annie Powassin, passed away at the Northwest Angle. Louis Caron was her father. Alice worked in the kitchen at the Warroad Hotel and Warroad Hospital. George and Alice had nine children. Henry was kid #8.

Like other Warroad kids he could be found outdoors; in summer playing baseball, swimming at the beach, jumping from the railroad bridge and playing on the river. He and his friends crafted rafts to take themselves to Government Island in the Warroad River where they built forts and played. "It was incredibly muddy and mucky. You would sink to your knees in mud." Seeking dryer adventures, the kids headed down Tower Road to climb the 100-foot navigational tower.

When he wanted spending money, Henry shagged balls for the Warroad Muskies at the old ball park near the current bus garage. "Tony Stukel would give five cents for every foul ball retrieved. It was enough to buy a pop or popcorn." Dusk meant hide-andseek until the 10:00 p.m. curfew whistle blew across town and everyone headed



An exceptional athlete, Boucha excelled Minneapolis and worked after he at whatever sport he gave his time and energy to. "I felt a little guilty. > Boucha played summer hockey in graduated high school in 1969. Declining scholarships at various instead with the Winnipeg Jets Junior A team in Western Canada. Shortly thereafter, he was picked to play for the U.S. National Team in the 1970 World Championship Group "B" with Don Ross gold medal. He was 18 years old. The following summer, while working at Marvin Windows & Doors, Boucha National Team coach, Murray Williamson, was quick to act, negotiating with the Pentagon for Boucha to be assigned to the national and Olympic Teams. Henry was stationed in Fort Knox, KY; Fort Gordon, GA, and Germany. He spent the next two hockey seasons playing



Hockey World Championships in Bern & Geneva, Switzerland and the 1972 Olympics in Sapporo, Japan, winning a silver medal.

After the '72 Olympics, Boucha received a 6-month early out from the Army while the U.S. pulled troops out of Vietnam. He played professional hockey five more years with the Detroit Red Wings, Minnesota North Stars, Minnesota Fighting Saints, Kansas City Scouts, and Colorado Rockies, racking up 247 NHL games. While in Minnesota, a career-ending eye injury caused him to retire at the age of 25. His proudest hockey moment was in 1995 when he was inducted into the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame. "It's nice to be recognized by your peers for your achievements." His proudest career moment, though, is carrying on Ojibwa culture and traditions; fighting against poverty, for human rights and education, and using his hockey platform to do that.

Boucha credits the 1992 Gathering of the Nations powwow in Albuquerque for setting him on the path he is on today. Along with 10 other Native American Olympians being honored at the powwow, the athletes discussed the predicament of losing talented Indian athletes in their early teens. They agreed kids needed motivation to make them proud and to want to stay engaged in sports. "Anything positive to build them up after the annihilation Indian people experienced from colonization," Boucha said. "Standing there with these amazing people - Billy Mills a '64 gold medalist; Buster Charles, who placed fourth in the decathlon in the 1932 Olympics; Jesse Renick a '48 Games gold medalist, and Grace Thorpe, Jim Thorpe's daughter who brought his 1912 gold medal - hearing their stories, I realized - they were the role models."

At the time, Boucha was already involved with the Indian Parent Committee in Warroad. He was the Indian Education Director from 1991 - 1995 then served as the chairperson of the Indian Parent Committee until 2008. While selling real estate with Pahlen Realty, he took this vision a step further. Always in the back of his mind, was this incredible project of the Native American Olympians. Finally, while living in Alaska, he made his passion and dream come true. He wrote a book and established his own production company, Boucha Films LLC, to create a documentary about Native American Olympic athletes. "Talking and telling stories means healing."

Currently, Boucha sells real estate with Edina Realty in the Twin Cities area and consults for the South Washington County school district, which includes 26 schools, helping them build an Indian Education program. He serves on several boards including the Herb Brooks

50+ game schedules including appearances at the 1971 Ice Foundation Board, the Juel Fairbanks Chemical Dependency Board and is president of Kah-Bay-Kah-Nong, Inc. a non-profit he started in Warroad in 1997. With his granddaughter, 2016 Warroad graduate Shalese Snowdon, he also serves on the National Coalition Against Racism in Sports and Media board. "Racism is still here but it's better. We're educating our youth and today we have more teachers, lawyers, doctors - and some come back to the community to



SNOWMOBILING

A big lake, big forests and vast prairies provide the perfect setting for snowmobiling! Trails open December 1st with over 300 miles of marked and groomed trails within Roseau County maintained by a local non-profit organization, the Roseau County Trailblazers. The main "open" country trails connect all the towns within the county. These trails also connect with the wilderness trails of Beltrami Island State Forest and the EDA Trails in Lost River State Forest as well as the trails in Kittson County on the west and Lake of the Woods County trails on the east. The Northwest Angle Edge Riders groom 132 miles of beautiful land trails covering the Northwest Angle and Islands, as well as lake trails which will take you on a scenic trip or connect you to Warroad, Baudette, or Canadian trail systems. The Lake of the Woods Drifters maintain over 460 miles of trails from the Northwest Angle to Waskish and from Warroad to Big Falls. These groups organize fun days and group rides.




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


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DON ROSS: A ROSEAU ALL AMERICAN

1970 U.S. National Team

With the passing of two local hockey greats in 2017 - 1956 Olympic silver medalists, Gordon "Ginny" Christian and Dan McKinnon it's with a special reverence that I sit down to visit with another hockey legend, Roseau native Don Ross. Like a child with a favorite book, I relax into the familiar storyline of passion paired with the youth ingenuity of a small town kid. Hockey not in rinks, but on rivers, ponds, and frozen farmers' fields. Nothing but the ice, a stick and a puck – or whatever they could scrounge up – to play all day.

A talented athlete, Ross played football, hockey, baseball, track and golf, making him the most-lettered athlete in Roseau Rams' history. Ross saw three high school state hockey tournaments. The Rams won the state championship in 1958 and 1959. Ross' hat trick in the 1959 state championship sealed the win for Roseau, ending their season with a clean sweep of 31 wins and no losses. It was a tough pill to swallow, his senior year, when Warroad defeated Roseau 1-0 in a face-off at the regional play-offs that would bring the Rams' state-bound journey to an abrupt end. (The Rams would make the move from Section 8A to Section 8AA in the 1997-'98 season.) In 1961, the Rams got their redemption and won the state championship again.

After high school, Ross chose to attend UND. Despite being a successful forward, his coach, Barry Thorndycraft, had the wisdom to put Ross where his talents would be even better utilized. At the beginning of his junior year, his coach pulled him aside and asked how he felt about being moved to defense. Ross had no problem with it; ready to serve the team and give his best in any position.

His first game as a defender was against Michigan State. The team took a tough hit, losing 5-6 after trouncing the Spartans the night before, 11-4. Not one to give up, Ross took the lesson learned and worked on improving. UND finished the season victorious as the 1963 NCAA Men's Ice Hockey champions. Ross was named All-American.

He took the next year off to try out, then play, the 1964 Olympic team. After the United States' successful 1960 Olympic grab for gold, the Soviets came back with a vengeance, determined to dominate. The Russians would take the gold and do so for the next three Olympic appearances until the 1980 Miracle on Ice team with Neal Broten, Roseau and Dave Christian, Warroad.

Returning to UND, Ross finished his college career a three-time letter winner and twice All-American. He is a member of the University of North Dakota Letter winners Association Hall of Fame and graduated with a Bachelor's degree in Education.

Team chemistry is something athletes are lucky to experience once, maybe twice, in a lifetime. "I've been around a lot of winners," Ross said. "Good chemistry means good results and a lot of fun playing."

During his junior year of high school, Ross experienced this amazing mix of team alchemy as the football, hockey and baseball teams all finished their regular seasons undefeated. The next magical team was the Fighting Sioux of '62-'63, which resulted in the NCAA Division I win. Finally, despite finishing fifth in the 1967 World Championship Group "A" in Vienna, the chemistry of this team was the best Ross ever experienced.

With the likes of Carl Wetzel, John Cunniff, and Herb Brooks, coach Murray Williamson described the team in his 1978 book, *The Great American Hockey Dilemma*, as having a "brand of spirit, hustle and courage." Williamson wrote of the first win against Sweden in the 1967 tournament as "...the United States' biggest upset in international hockey since the 1960 Squaw Valley games... We did it with only 15 healthy players and a spare goalie. That game gave life to our new national program and it filled us with hope of success in the seven-game championships."

The tough competition offered up by the Swedes, the Czechs and the Russians, however, overpowered the Americans' magic potion of grit and skill. The team would take a beating, bringing their numbers down to 13 healthy players with a painful laundry list of injuries – but would still rally an unbelievable finish of 3-3-1, winning just enough to qualify for the 1968 Olympics. Even though they wouldn't return home from France with an Olympic medal, that 1967 national team left an indelible impression upon European hockey that the United States was indeed a strong contender.

After the Olympics, Ross was invited to play for Klagenfurt Athletic Club (KAC) in Austria before rejoining the U.S. national team for three more seasons, which included winning gold in the 1970 World Championship Group "B" in Bucharest with Henry Boucha and gaining an All-Star distinction.

At 29 years old, Ross was ready to hang up his skates when

the Klagenfurt club called again. "I told my wife I was done unless she wanted to go back to Austria one more time." They packed up their 3- and 5-year-olds and headed back for one last season at KAC with Ross as both player and coach.

In 1972, he returned to Roseau where he owned and operated the True Value hardware store on Main Avenue until he retired in 2005. Mary, his wife, owned "Mary's on Main" – a lady's dress shop - which they sold in 2002, just missing the flood that ravaged the town on June 11.

Ross was a hockey referee for youth hockey for ten years, learning even more about the game. "I learned that the best compliment is when they don't know who the ref is."

He still gets out on the ice two days a week with the Old Timer's hockey at the Rams Center and has made appearances with Byfuglien Trucking at the USA Hockey National Adult Hockey championship, which dominated their age division from 2008 until 2017.

Like many athletes, Ross took his leadership skills and ability to work as a team to his community. He has either served on boards or been a chairman for his church, the Oak Crest golf course, the Planning Commission, the Civic & Commerce Board and was president of the Jaycees. Currently he is serving his sixth year on the Roseau City Council. "I got involved, then did my best – not so much in terms of accomplishments, but in giving to, and giving back to, the community." He laughed and added, "You have two choices: put up or shut up. So I got involved."

What hockey has done for him is create lifelong memories and friendships which have culminated in a variety of reunions with former teammates – as a Roseau Ram, a Fighting Sioux and as an Olympian.





DAVID JOHNSON VINTAGE SNO-CAT SPECTACULAR

It was an eerie experience that day on Lake of the Woods. BY ROB CROWE

On a sunny early March morning, after a leisurely morning breakfasting and visiting while David Johnson replenished the bird feeder from his perch on the running boards of a Polaris Widetrak FS, David, Lyle Roseen, aka "Trapper", and I left David's cabin from the Northwest Angle - our fifth back to Roseau without further incident. He was the epitome annual trip to Johnson's cabin in the books. We had come up the day before to do a few basic chores and were scheduled to be home in the afternoon if things went smoothly. The "afternoon" part was attained, but the "smooth" - well, not from the tumble. auite.

The going was good on the Border trail until we dropped down onto the lake where things changed drastically. I throttled my Widetrack FS down the trail at a speed of just under 30 mph into near whiteout conditions. Above us, I could see the sun clearly, yet could barely make out the guideposts positioned precisely at the correct distances to keep us pointed in the right direction. David was second in line with Trapper trailing on a Switchback. Later, Trapper would say the only thing he could see was the blaze orange camo of my jacket as he followed across the lake.

The lake trail suddenly dipped, crossing the plowed road of the Springsteel Island lake access only to rise again on the other side to reveal a wicked twist unseen in the whiteout. Unable to react fast enough, my sled bobbled as I hit the south edge. David, age 88 at the time, must have hit it differently because, when I looked back, I saw him do a pirouette off his snowmobile. I circled back, stopped at

octogenarian - mounted it, returned and helped David back on the big machine. Soon after, when we came onto the river trail past the Point at Warroad, it was sunshine and clear sailing again. David drove his sled the twenty-five or so miles of tough; not too many 88-year-olds out there with injuries from motorsport activities. But I did catch a bit of static from his wife, Eleanor, after David mentioned having a few aches

David Johnson grew up as Per and Britta Hetteen's foster son on their farm along Sucker Creek, eight miles south of Roseau. His mother died shortly after his birth, and Britta, the attending midwife, promised his mother she would take care of him. Though David remained somewhat connected with his birth family, he often stated, "Per and Britta were my parents. When my dad would come to visit, I would go out to the barn because I was afraid he was going to take me away." He never did, so David was raised a farmer's son, learning all the skills expected of a Roseau county farm boy in the 1930s. His early interest in finding a way to quickly traverse over snow led him to attempt to construct a Model T-powered airsled with his close friend, Orlin Johnson - a project David said didn't quite get completed. David overhauled a tractor for a neighbor at age sixteen as well, moving to the neighbor's homestead for the duration of the project as was the custom of the time.

World War II intervened and David went off to serve his country in the China Theater. Back home, David's David's sled - which had traveled quite a bit past the fallen foster brothers, Edgar and Allen, started a fledgling

company named Hetteen Hoist and Derrick. They offered part ownership to David, who sent part of every paycheck to help the entrepreneurial endeavor. Once back home, David married Eleanor Knochenmus and joined the brothers designing and building equipment such as sprayers, grain conveyors, trailers - and even playground equipment - as the company struggled to stay affoat. In 1954, they renamed the company Polaris. The company started to make its mark building straw choppers when, in early 1956, David designed and built his first Sno-Cat.

David embodied the frontier spirit. The story is often told that he waited until Edgar was gone on an extended trip before devoting company resources to build this daring new machine. Though upset at first, soon Edgar was the sno-cat's greatest proponent. Edgar sold that first machine to help meet company expenses. The second machine, which Allen built thinking it was for his personal use, was hauled to the Northwest Angle and sold to a logger for the same reason.

Edgar, David and Allen embarked on a journey that ultimately thrust two towns in northern Minnesota, Roseau and Thief River Falls, into worldwide leadership and excellence in the snowmobile manufacturing industry; later springboarding Polaris and Arctic Cat into the off-road vehicle motorsports industry with the evolution of the ATV.

The ventures wouldn't have succeeded without the determination of the founders coupled with the farm-honed skills and devotion of those early employees. These individuals worked diligently to build and improve the machines, often waiting extended periods between

David often laughed and said, "We built them because we were lazy. We didn't want to have to ski in to the Salol cabin!" The Salol cabin was an early destination for sno-cat rides, but was later relegated to stopping point status when David purchased the cabin on Bear River at the Angle.

David rode sno-cats until well after most would have given it up. Every two years, Polaris delivered a pair of new sleds to David and Eleanor. He would pick out a Touring model for himself and a sporty Switchback (or similar) for Eleanor. One of the last sleds David picked out was the WideTrak FS - an interesting pick because this behemoth of sorts was the largest and heaviest built by Polaris at the time.

To celebrate the indomitable spirit of the designer and builder of the first Polaris snowmobile, in 2012, several of David's friends helped me start an event we named the "David Johnson Vintage Sno-Cat Spectacular." This annual event, usually held at the Pioneer Farm west of Roseau, celebrates an era when these new machines were called sno-cats and winter became something to be anticipated rather than feared.

For the first article I ever wrote about David, I also drew a caricature of the legendary founder driving a sno-cat composed of parts of machines from throughout the history of Polaris. It was a rear-engined sled, the nose reminiscent of the early machines, but with both front and rear modern suspension. The powerplant was a Victory motorcycle engine with a RZR cab frame to protect the driver. I had a wild idea I could build this for the show and sent an email to some of the folks in Polaris Engineering. By happenstance, Orlin Johnson's son-in-law, Darrel Foss, saw the email and saw to it the parts were made available. David loaned me a stall in his shop where the unit came together. It was complete enough to display at the first show and, by spring, it was drivable -David having tested it in the field by his house. Today, one of the Sno-Cat Spectacular annual highlights is when "The Special" - as it became known as - makes several loud, fast runs down the race track.

Another highlight of the show is the annual Arctic vs. Polaris Grudge race, where a former race driver from each company is invited to participate in a best-of-three drag race on vintage sno-cats. After the race, the drivers are given shop-built trophies, welded up in my garage. A cutout of "The Special" adorns the top; the tallest trophy to the winner and the shorter one for second place. There are no losers.

Some attendees, including employees of Polaris' early days, bring their own vintage sno-cats to the show; unique sleds restored to pristine shape for all to enjoy. The show is held the first weekend in February. To learn more about David Johnson and the fascinating history of Polaris Industries, visit the Polaris Experience Center in Roseau.

A Taste Of NORTHERN MINNESOTA

BLUEBERRY SCONES

INGREDIENTS

2 cups all-purpose flour

1/2 cup sugar

1 tablespoon baking powder

(yes, TABLEspoon)

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 tablespoon grated orange zest

1/2 cup cold salted butter, cut into very small cubes

1 large egg

1/2 cup cold heavy cream

1 cup blueberries, fresh a few tablespoons of additional heavy cream for brushing the tops turbinado sugar for sprinkling the tops

Preheat the oven to 400 degrees. Stir the flour, sugar, baking powder, salt, and orange zest in the bowl of a stand mixer (or just a mixing bowl). Add the butter. Mix ingredients with an electric mixer until fine crumbs form. With the mixer on low speed, add the egg and heavy cream in a slow stream. Mix until a thick, stiff dough forms. Add the blueberries and mix until the blueberries are just incorporated into the dough. If some of them break, that's okay – you'll get those pretty juice drips down the side. Flour your hands. Remove the dough from the mixing bowl and place on a floured work surface. Roll into a rectangle, about 1 inch thick. Cut into 8 triangles; pull the triangles apart and brush with heavy cream. Sprinkle with crystal sugar. Bake for 18-20 minutes or until golden brown and firm to the touch. Sprinkle again with crystal sugar for extra texture. Enjoy warm; store leftovers in an airtight container for 1-2 days.

GARLIC PARMESAN ROASTED ASPARAGUS

INGREDIENTS

1/2 pound fresh asparagus

1/2 tsp salt


1/2 tsp fresh ground black pepper

3 cloves garlic

2-3 Tablespoons parmesan cheese olive oil spray

DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Line a rimmed baking sheet with aluminum foil and set aside. Rinse the asparagus and trim off woody end pieces. Spread out in a thin layer on top of the prepared cookie sheet. Spray the asparagus lightly with a coat of olive oil spray. Sprinkle with salt, pepper, garlic, and parmesan cheese. Use your hands to mix the asparagus with all of the ingredients, then lay out into an even layer again. Spray with one more light coat of olive oil. Bake in the preheated oven for 8 minutes. Remove from oven and serve immediately. Enjoy!

Located one hour west of Roseau, enjoy the drive through prairies, forests and farmland to Hallock. Check out the craft beverage scene in the only town in northwestern Minnesota to have both a craft brewery and a craft spirit distillery. Attend the annual WhiskeyFest in November. On the way, stop at Lake Bronson State Park to enjoy some swimming, hiking, birding and fishing.



Hit the water first thing in the morning and enjoy a day on the beach or go farther east to fish or paddle on the Rainy River. Fishing guides and launch services are available through many area resorts, providing all the equipment you need. They'll even clean your fish and provide a shore lunch. During winter months, rent a sleeper house and you won't miss a bite as you fish all night.





Head north from Roseau on Hwy 310 to the Lost River State Forest. This area is known for excellent birding, particularly for viewing great gray owls. Other birds in sight include snowy, northern hawk, and northern saw-whet owls; spruce grouse; whip-poor-wills; three-toed and black-backed woodpeckers; yellow-bellied flycatchers; boreal chickadees; and magnolia warblers. As part of the greater Roseau River Wildlife Management Area, immerse yourself in wildlife and nature opportunities. Three snowmobile trails run through this forest offering some of the most remote wilderness trails in the state.

Hunters love all that Beltrami Island State Forest has to offer. Loaded with trails, this state forest is home to an impressive network of snowmobile trails that connect with a larger snowmobile trail system. Forest lovers can view the flora and fauna indigenous to the area while picking mushrooms and berries. Hayes Lake State Park provides camping, fishing and recreation such as swimming, geocaching and canoing. Trails around the lake are great for hiking, biking, cross-country skiing and snowshoeing.

HUNTING WITH MY DAUGHTERS

Katelyn carefully brought the gun up, aimed and squeezed the trigger. The distinctive sound of a .243 echoed across the landscape. Both deer lit out. One retreated into the long canary grass to the west of our makeshift stand, while the larger of the two ran out onto the field, collapsing about 50 yards into the flight. It was a nice sized doe.

This was the second day of the hunt. We'd seen nothing the morning before, but our hopes were high as we trudged the quarter mile to the stand in the pre-dawn chill. The farmer who rented our farmland had started digging up the field in preparation for the next year but had graciously left a strip of the ryegrass residue in front of the stand to help our hunting efforts. Deer sign abounded.

There was a great field of view to the north and east across the cropland, with a triangular bit of forest to the west. A seasonal waterway ran diagonally, northwest to southeast, on the south side of the stand. This time of year, the tall canary grass and ragged willows along the shallow ditch could easily hide any number of deer.

Our stand was an oversized picnic table; three camp chairs perched atop the extended-width table top. I sat between my two daughters, fifteen-year-old Valeri and seventeen-year-old Katelyn.

Katelyn had built a brush blind on the front side that did little to disguise our blaze orange outfits. We had just nicely ensconced ourselves on the modified picnic table, facing north, when the two deer exited the canary grass to the west of the stand. Though I had a license, I only had two deer rifles, so I let the two girls have the guns. Valeri had my classic Remington 700 ADL, a .270 with a 3X9 Bushnell Banner scope. Katelyn had the .243, a Savage bolt action with iron sights.

I'll admit to being slightly startled when the deer appeared. Katelyn had her head down. I watched her, thinking she hadn't seen them. The deer seemed unaware of us. I nudged her and said something but by then she was in the process of raising her gun. A few short seconds later, she bagged her first deer.

We exited the stand, making a beeline to the deer. Katelyn posed with the prize for a photo before I pulled my knife out and started the arduous task of field dressing. In the meantime, Val scanned the field for deer.

As I started the field dressing process, someone close by started shooting. Val had seen three deer come out of the triangular wood plot about a hundred yards away. She hadn't done much shooting before, so she moved a few dozen yards closer. She pulled up the .270, aimed and shot. Two of the deer ran off, but the third stayed put. She shot again, then again. Somehow, the deer stayed put. She took another shot, this one putting the deer into flight.

Thinking she had missed the deer, Val walked back over to us. I sent Katelyn back to the house to drive the Dakota out to retrieve the deer. Once we loaded the doe up, the three of us walked over to where Val's deer had last been seen.

We spread out and scouted. Val yelled out. She showed us a broken-off sapling with a large blood spot. Katelyn took charge, leading us down a deer path where we soon found a yearling doe lying in the canary grass. Val, a novice, had accomplished the ultimate: a neck shot so clean the deer was already bled out. I started my second field dress of the day. A few minutes into the task, a neighbor showed up, having heard the excitement from his stand not too far away. He had a little saw we used to cut the pelvic bone, speeding the field dressing process even more.

Katelyn was sent to bring the pickup closer and after the field dressing was complete, the neighbor helped us drag the deer out to the field and load the prize. We ended our day with two deer, one proud papa and a memory of a lifetime.















A "True North" Biking Experience

If you have three or more days free and are looking for a memorable bicycling adventure in Minnesota, consider the Roseau/ Warroad area for that 'true north' experience. A few miles south of the Canadian border this area is full of fun out of the ordinary places to ride. With the family, enjoy the trails within each city. Or, for that epic two-wheeled wilderness experience, plan on exploring the old logging roads and trails in the mammoth Beltrami Island State Forest.

Trailhead: Roseau City Park

Distance: 4.5 miles

Elevation Gain: None

Difficulty: Family-friendly

Road conditions: All asphalt, bike path, and some road crossings

Caution: Watch for downtown shopping traffic

Sights to see: To the west through Roseau City Park the trail crosses the picturesque Roseau River into the downtown area. To the east, from the park, the paved multi-purpose trail runs the full length of a water control greenway providing an opportunity to enjoy the scenic characteristics of the area and wildlife watching.

In and Around Town Experiences

Perfect for the whole family, both towns offer a paved bike trail and quiet street routes to get you to and from your hotel or campsite when visiting.



Exploring the Area

Between the two towns, nearly forty percent of Roseau County is open and accessible through state and county parks and wildlife areas, making your options for a true north experience endless. Here you will find ample opportunities for gravel-road rides or wilderness fat and mountain biking adventures in all seasons. Exploring the area on your bike, you'll encounter geographic features such as tamarack bogs, prairie grasslands and sandy pine forests. Along the way take in several wildlife viewing stations, pick berries, or go for a hike to add to your experience.



Beltrami State Forest

Warroad is the gateway to Minnesota's second largest state forest. This huge forest has more than 138 miles of logging roads and many technical single-track paths to explore on your bike. Make sure you have a compass or GPS device. Exploring the low flatlands, peat bogs and ridges covered in pines, it's easy to get lost. Pedaling along the forest roads you will pass through the heart of blueberry country. Also along the way, you may see old foundations which are remnants from historic pioneer settlements.

Hayes Lake State Park

Accessible by bike, this state park is located 18 miles southeast of Roseau, on County Road 4. Located on the edge of Beltrami Island State Forest, this quiet true north park includes Hayes Lake, 3,000 acres of pines and miles of trails. The park also has a fishing pier, swimming beach and campsites. The lake is a non-motorized recreational area and canoeing is a popular activity. View rare birds such as bald eagles, great grey owls, Sandhill cranes and a variety of warblers. Wildlife found in the area includes elk, moose, bear, and wolves.



Norris Camp

Sprague Creek Natural Area

easy to ride to, the Peatland Scientific and Natural Area is just north of Roseau. Once you arrive this area offers hiking trails that feature many bird viewing opportunities.

Trailhead: Clear River Tower, 10 miles south of Warroad on CR 5.

Distance: 65 miles

Elevation Gain: 700 ft.

Difficulty: Very difficult

NORRIS CAMP LOOP

Road conditions: Gravel, soft sand at points, some asphalt

Caution: Very isolated route. Bring enough supplies and GPS. Poor or no cell coverage

Sights to see: Clear River Observation Tower, former CCC camp at Norris Camp, historic landing strip near Airport Trail Rd, moose, bear, wolves, and berries.

Route: Go north 1 mile on CR 5. Turn east (right) on Bednar Trail. At Roosevelt Forest Rd./Norris Camp Rd turn south (right). This road turns into Faunce-Butterfield Rd., then turn west (right). South of Norris Camp take Airport Rd Trail. At Hogsback/O'Brien Rd turn east (left). At Faunce Forest Rd, turn north (left). Faunce campground has a water pump. This road turns into CR 2 (asphalt). Go west (left) on Krull Trail. Stay west and go on Carps Trail until you are back to Roosevelt Forest Rd. Head north to retrace your steps to Bednar Trail, then south on CR 5 and back to Clear River.


